<b>wealth</b> <small>noun.</small> Wealth is a great amount of money.  Carlos used part of his hard-earned <b>wealth</b> to pay the fee.	<b>alarmed</b> <small>past tense verb.</small> Alarmed means afraid or frightened.  Don't be <b>alarmed</b> .

<b>anguish</b> <small>noun.</small> Anguish is a great suffering of the mind, or agony.  I can see by your <b>anguish</b> that now you realize true wealth is not gold, but life.	<b>necessary</b> <small>adj.</small> Something that is necessary needs to be done or is required.  Is it really <b>necessary</b> ?

<b>obsessed</b> <small>past tense verb.</small> When are obsessed, you think about one thing all the time and nothing else.  You were so <b>obsessed</b> with gold that all you wanted was more.	<b>possess</b> <small>verb.</small> When you possess something, you have or own it.  King Midas <b>possessed</b> more gold than anyone in the world.

<b>reward</b> <small>noun.</small> A reward is something given or received in return for something done.  As a <b>reward</b> for your kindness to a poor Traveler, I will grant you a wish.	<b>treasure</b> <small>noun.</small> A treasure can be money, jewels, or other things that are valuable.  It seemed like a <b>treasure</b> , but it was not enough to buy a puppy.
